The idea of a slope for reading and writing dates back to accounts clerks in the 18th century. Until a few decades ago, the idea was still applied to school desks. The use of a slope improves posture, reducing the load on neck and shoulders.

When considering a writing slope, think about:

- How much space you have on your desk (A3 size or bigger).
- Whether it needs to be portable (think about the weight).
- Whether you need to use it with a computer.
- Whether the appearance is important.
